ERNEST TUBB (Decca 29415; 9-29415)

The inimitable Ernest Tubb, who makes it a habit of turning out consistently good records, comes through with a double-barreled hit contender on his latest release. On one end, Tubb puts his smooth and mellow "touch" to a middle beat, sentimental piece dubbed "The Woman's Touch". Coupling, "Kansas City Blues", is a rhythmic blues item that the artist handles in polished fashion. It's a "pick-em" platter.

"THE NUTTY LADY OF SHADY LANE" (2:29) [Paxton ASCAP—S. Tepper, R. Bennett]

HOMER AND JETHRO (RCA Victor 20-6029; 47-6029)

The two-man wrecking crew, Homer and Jethro, are up to their old tricks again, namely "tune-wrecking". The boys have a sensational talent for tearing down the top pop tunes, rebuilding them with a laugh-a-second foundation and managing to garner loads of sales and spins in the process. This time the comics successfully destroy "The Naughty (now the Nutty) Lady Of Shady Lane" and "Mr. Sandman". A two-sided laugh and sales must.

JACKIE HILL & JACK CARDWELL (King 1442; 45-1442)

"ARE YOU MINE" (2:13) [Dandelion BMI—Grashey, Amadeo, Lorrie] The inviting vocal stylings of Jack Cardwell are teamed up with the young and talented tones of Jackie Hill on an appealing cover of the current click.

"KO KO MO" (2:23) [Meridian BMI—Forest, Haven] Cardwell solos as he zestfully belts out this pop and r&b smash. Delightful pairing.

LEETY FRIZZELL (Columbia 21336; 4-21336)

B "A FOREST FIRE" (2:14) [Hill & Range BMI—Frizzell, Adams] Lefty Frizzell projects a middle beat tearful item with a tender emotion that tells the story of his unhappiness. Strings and country piano add the proper flavor to the etching.

"MAKING BELIEVE" (3:05) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Work] Flip is another weeper that Frizzell performs in soft, sincere fashion. Fine material.

THE ANDREWS BROTHERS (MGM 11926; K11926)

"TODAY YOU SAID GOODBYE" (2:20) [Acuff-Rose BMI—J. Andrews, B. Andrews] The Andrews Brothers blend their vocal chords in enchanting fashion on a middle tempo, heartfelt piece. Melody and lyrics blend warmly.

"THAT'S WHY WE DRIFTED APART" (2:39) [Acuff-Rose BMI—J. Andrews, B. Andrews] Lower lid is an up-beat, sentimental item that the boys wax effectively.

FRANK STARR (Lin 1009; 45-1009)

"THE DIRTY BIRD SONG"
(2:00) [Lin BMI—Baker, Miller, Starr, Leonard] Frank Starr's full rounded voice comes across in exciting fashion on this driving novelty fashioned after TV comedian, George Gobel's well publicized expression.

"DIG THEM SQUEAKY SHOES" (2:14) [Lin BMI—Baker, Miller] Flip is a solid jump item with delectable lyrics. A potent debut, on both ends, by Starr and his Rock-away Boys.

BIFF COLLIE (Starday 178; 45-178)

"WHAT THIS OLD WORLD NEEDS" (2:21) [Starrite BMI—D. Shannon] Biff Collie comes up with a socko reading on a fast-paced ditty with tantalizing lyrics. "More lovin' and less shovin' should help straighten out the world situation", says Collie.

"LONELY" (2:35) [Starrite BMI —Collie] On the lower deck Collie vocals a slow beat, lover's lament in poignant fashion.

CURTIS GORDON (Mercury 70538; 70538-X45)

B. "DON'T TRADE" (2:01) [Starrite] The distinctive tones of Curtis Gordon shine on the artist's first effort for the diskery. A touching, middle tempo piece that should cash in nicely.

"CHOPSTICKS MAMBO" (2:02) [Cedarwood BMI—Arr: Stebach, Dorney] Lower portion is a sprightly instrumental combination of the Oriental oldie with an "ugh" beat.

PEE WEE KING & HIS BAND (RCA Victor 20-6005; 47-6005)

"YOU CAN'T HARDLY GET THEM NO MORE" (2:30) [Valley BMI—F. F. Wilson] Pee Wee King, Red Stewart, the trio and band all pitch in to knock out a most enjoyable novelty built around the popular teevee phrase.

"TWEEDLEE DEE" (2:23) [Progressive BMI—W. Scott] The r&b and pop hit is treated to a bright, bouncy performance by the entire crew. Side could bust through.

"LUCKY" JOE ALMOND (Trumpet 233; 45-233)

"EVERY DAY OF THE WEEK" [Globe BMI—J. Almond] "Lucky" Joe Almond decks out a flavorful, romantic ditty with enticing lyrics and a solid beat. It seems that Almond's gonna pitch the woo with his gal clear around the calendar.

"TANGLEWOOD WALTZ" [Globe BMI—J. Almond] Reverse etching is a sad, slow waltz item that the chanter waxes in feelingful style.
